

Mission over Model

When I first stepped into full time ministry I took the experiences I had and assumed it would all translate perfectly...

Before I graduated from college, I had served in my youth group, I had led a college ministry, and I had led worship at a small church plant. One thing I did when I led the college ministry was take really well known songs and make a sort of "Christian" version of them. I was like Weird Al for Christian college ministry...

You name any popular song from around the early 2000s and there's a good chance I rewrote it. This was fun and made sense in our context.

After college, I became a youth pastor and tried the same tactic...it failed miserably. It turns out these kids had no interest in singing along with songs that sounded like popular songs but were actually about Jesus.

I realized, the gospel never changes, but how we deliver it may. As they say, and as I believe "mission over model." I assumed every mode of ministry would work everywhere, but it turns out context is more than meets the eye.

After almost 20 years of full time ministry I continue to remind myself of this when I lead. I'm not sure if you know this, but our church, the body of Christ that gathers at The Chapel at Seaside, is just about the weirdest church of all time. Nearly every week we have a full house, both inside and out, of people who choose to worship with us. Locals who call the Chapel home, guests who are visiting the beach, and people just curious about what is going on in our beautiful building. They range across the spectrum of Christian traditions. Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Catholic, Anglican, Bible Church, Pentecostal, nondenominational, Lutheran, and everything else you could imagine. We are a varied bunch and it is both incredibly beautiful and wildly challenging. Everyone comes to church with an expectation based on their home church, or previous experience. We all have a worldview...and rarely do we leave it at the door. One of our challenges was, "How do we share the sacrament of communion with this varied body of believers?" Many of those traditions listed above split over how they viewed or practiced communion/the Lord's Supper/Eucharist/breaking bread...so how do we share this incredible sacrament together?

The Solution: For about the past year or so, we've been practicing communion the first Sunday of every month at a communion service. This falls in line with many Protestant traditions. Though even within that group, there is a question about when to serve and who gets to share. Because we have so many people, we've recognized that we never want to catch someone off guard as it relates to things I can control. The Holy Spirit can gladly do that, but I won't. Church is not a time for an old trick-a-roo or bait and switch. We want our time of communion to be intentional for those who call this place home (as well as any visitors who desire to share in communion) to gather at the table, check their hearts with Jesus, and share in the body and blood.

If you haven't been able to join us yet, we hope you will on the first Sunday morning of every month at 9am and share in this beautiful moment. A moment where we believe Christ is with us and calling us to remember the Passover in Exodus, and the new liberation through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. He's calling us to remember the fulfillment of the covenant and the new covenant. He's calling for us to turn from our sin, to repent and turn towards him and his way of life. And in that beautiful and mysterious moment, by the power of the Spirit we encounter Jesus, his body broken for us, and his blood shed for us.

I would love for you to join us next time we share this together. It's a simple 15 minutes or so together followed by our normal time of worship at 10am. This month we are planning to have some refreshments between the two services so we can connect with one another in this time that is intended to be communal.

I remember there is a saying for pastors, don't change the way they do communion your first Sunday. After 20 years I can confirm, those are wise words. We waited a year, prayed and discerned and tried a few things. This communion service is what we feel strength in. We just want to make sure you know and if you so choose, join us for this special time together. And don't worry, no Weird Al style rewrites...at least not this month.
